

Advanced Placement (AP) Information

What is Advanced Placement (AP)?



Nationally standardized, college-level curriculum developed by College Board in over 30 subject areas.



Opportunity to earn credit for college by achieving a specific score an AP exam at the end of the year.



Exams are scored on scale of 1-5. Typically, a Level 3 or higher awards credit.



AP Classroom is a virtual tool that benefits students as they prepare for the AP exams.

What are the requirements to enroll?	Recommended 3.00 GPA and Level 3 or higher on most recent FSA/EOC.		
How is GPA calculated for high school?	GPA at BRHS is calculated on a 5.0 scale. * Colleges and Bright Futures program may only calculate GPA on 4.50 scale.		
How is the college credit awarded?	AP Exam are scored on scale of 1 – 5. Most colleges award credit for a score of 3 or higher. * Students may use AP Credit Policy Search Tool to research specific institutions.		
Is transportation provided?	Students may ride the bus to BRHS if within the school zone.		
What is the cost?	AP course materials and exams are paid for by the School District.		
What is the impact on college/university transcript?	No impact on post-secondary GPA. * Credit may appear on college transcript as CR (credit) or P (Pass) with number of credit hours.





Dispelling the Myth about AP Scores

College Board Research Findings - June 2021

→ Enrollment Records for 1.5 million students and a subsample of 410,000 students with college grades ←

Key Takeaway: AP students who earn a score of 1 or 2, or average a score of 1 or 2 across their AP Exams in high school, have **better college outcomes** than academically similar college students who did not take an AP course and exam.

<u>Finding # 1</u>: AP students are <u>more likely to enroll in a four-year college</u> in comparison to academically similar peers who did not take AP courses.

<u>Finding # 2</u>: Students who earn AP scores of 2 are <u>well prepared to succeed</u> in introductory college coursework.

<u>Finding # 3</u>: Many students who first score a 1 or 2 on an AP exam will <u>take</u> more AP courses and score higher.

AP Capstone Courses - Seminar & Research

What It Is

AP Capstone is not a course. It's a two-year program based on two AP courses—AP Seminar and AP Research. Other AP courses teach you, in depth, about a specific subject, like biology or U.S. history. AP Seminar and AP Research are different. They focus on helping you develop academic skills you can use in any discipline. These skills include:

- Critical thinking: View issues from multiple perspectives and create arguments based on evidence.
- Collaboration: Work alone, in a group, and with expert advisers to communicate your ideas.

Conducting research: Explore various research methods and complete research projects on topics of your own choosing. Public speaking: Present and defend your work as a group and individually.

Dual Enrollment Information

What is Dual Enrollment?

Dual Enrollment provides an opportunity for students to earn credit for courses that meet both high school graduation requirements and can be used towards a degree program at the collegiate level.

BRHS partners with two institutions to provide dual enrollment opportunities:

- University of South Florida
- State College of Florida

Students can enroll in part-time or full-time dual enrollment programs while in high school.

Dual Enrollment (DE) Quick Facts

Main Questions	Points to Consider	
Where are courses offered?	On campus with USF and off campus at SCF or USF Campuses.	
What is the application process?	Online application. *Depending on the program, student may also be required to submit proof of residency, immunization record, online orientation, and DE contract.	
What are the requirements to enroll?	Both institutions require a specific cumulative GPA and minimum PERT, SAT, or ACT scores.	
How is GPA calculated for high school?	GPA at BRHS is calculated on a 5.0 scale. * Colleges and Bright Futures program may only calculate GPA on 4.50 scale.	
How is the college credit awarded?	Grade earned in the course is recorded on both high school transcript and college transcript.	
Is transportation provided?	Students or families must provide own transportation to USF or SCF.	
What is the cost?	Tuition and required textbooks are provided by the School District.	
What is the impact on college/university transcript?	Course grades are calculated into post-secondary GPA. * Students must submit an official transcript from USF or SCF to any other college/university that he or she may attend in the future.

Early College Programs

- Dual Enrollment allows for qualified students to enroll in approved college course-work that will satisfy both high school and college requirements.
 Students may qualify as early as 6th grade. Most students begin dual enrollment in the junior year of high school.
- Early Admissions allows qualified grade 12 students to enroll in approved college course-work during semester 1 and semester 2 in high school.
- Accelerated Dual Enrollment allows qualified grade 11 students the ability to potentially earn the AA degree (For Manatee & Sarasota county public school students and Lemon Bay High School & Charlotte Virtual in Charlotte County).

- Students may register for full-term classes <u>only</u> during Fall/Spring
- Strong students may consider Summer A, Summer B, or Summer C classes
- Students are required to follow the SCF academic calendar



Eligibility Requirements

Dual Enrollment & Early Admissions

- Student meets with HS counselor to determine eligibility
- 3.0 unweighted high school GPA
- Student must have <u>qualifying</u> PERT/ACT and/or SAT scores in Reading and Writing and/or Math to be placed into college level courses (no developmental courses)

Deadlines:

May 15th for Summer/Fall December 1st for Spring



Eligibility Requirements

Accelerated Dual Enrollment (ADE)

(For Manatee & Sarasota county public school students and Lemon Bay High School & Charlotte Virtual students in Charlotte County)

- Student meets with HS counselor to determine eligibility
- 3.3 unweighted high school GPA.
- Pass <u>all</u> portions of PERT or equivalent SAT/ACT scores.
- Academically ready for 11th grade. This includes English I & II, Algebra I & Geometry EOC passed & ELA 10th grade state assessment.

Deadlines:

May 15th for Summer/Fall December 1st for Spring



Eligibility Requirements

Students must have <u>qualifying</u> PERT, ACT, or SAT scores to be placed into <u>college level courses</u>.

Enrollment Process

- Step 1-Early College Application
 - EC application available at <u>www.scf.edu/apply</u>



- Upon initial review, SCF will send a Welcome Email with student credentials.
- If the student is continuing dual enrollment courses, a new application is not required. (A new application is required to return to the Early College programs after participating in college enrichment/non-degree program)
- Step 2- Official Test Scores must be sent to the Office of the Registrar (registrar@scf.edu) directly by College Board, ACT, or Cambridge. Super scoring is available with SAT/ACT/PERT. SCF students may take the PERT for free with SCF. PERT is by appointment only. Students may test once per semester and no more than twice per calendar year.

Enrollment Process

- Step 3-Early College Contract is submitted as part of the admission process. This digital contract includes the type of enrollment and area of interest (pathway). This form requires student, parent, and counselor approval.
- Step 4-Online Orientation is required prior to SCF registration for new students to SCF. Links to complete orientation are included in the Welcome Email.
- Step 5-SCF Registration must be secured <u>prior to</u> the DE deadline. Students should connect with their Success Coach for assistance with registration. Students must submit a detailed schedule to their high school counselor after completing registration.
- Step 6-Get Instructional Materials

What First-Time "New" Dual Enrollment Students Only Must Do:

- Before starting this application process, please read all the information below. The application must be completed on a laptop or a desktop computer using Google Chrome (DO NOT USE YOUR CELL PHONE).
- Students who need to register for tests at USF Tampa testing center must have an USF U
 number (U#) for the USF testing center (Complete the Non-Degree Application below
 and Activate your NetID to receive your U Number via your USF email).

- 3. Note: There is no summer program available. Parents and Students should fill out the High School Dual Enrollment Non Degree Seeking application together to ensure Residency, Immunizations and the medical history form are completed. The application process is initiated by completing the online USF "Non Degree Seeking" Application, as a High School Dual Enrollment student. Use Google Chrome on a laptop or desk top computer, not a cell phone. Students must enter the name of their high school to be considered, or that they are homeschooled. Students will select the Semester, Fall (August Course) or Spring (January Course); then select their USF Home Campus. AVOID MISTAKE: Make sure to select the semester (not summer) that you plan to take dual enrollment courses-either in August (Fall) or Spring (January). IMPORTANT: DO NOT Check Discipline or Misconduct unless you have done something illegal; school discipline referrals do not count unless the SRO was involved. On the last screen of the application, when asked to pay, just close the screen and your application will be processed and fees waived.
- 4. DO NOT PAY! Just close your browser.
- 5. Dual Enrollment applicants must establish residency by the same process as all applicants, please work with your parents or guardians when filling out the "Non-Degree Seeking" online application above. If taking online courses only, immunizations are not needed.
- 6. Students, you must set up your NetID (USF email) 2-3 days after applying. Do this by using the same email used on the application or use your U Number. USF communications will only be sent to students' USF email account. Activation of Student NetID is found here. Having trouble? Chat:https://itchat.usf.edu

- 7. Once the NetID is established, students will have their USF U# and provide it to their counselor. Parents / Students / Counselors or / administrators can submit the Dual Enrollment Informational Approval Form 1. This form is only completed once per year. Please save a copy of the submission to your computer or print your confirmation.
- 8. Students will use OASIS found under MyUSF at the top of the USF Homepage to look up courses they are considering for dual enrollment. They must have a course prefix, a course number and the five (5) digit CRN# for each course to be reviewed with their counselor, so that their counselors/administrators can submit Dual Enrollment Approval Form 2 for registration. Click here for a tutorial on how to look up courses in OASIS.
- Students must fill in the Student Course Planning Sheet before meeting with their counselor / administrator / homeschool parent who will fill out Dual Enrollment Approval Form 2.
- 10. Counselors/Homeschool Parent /Administrators must approve courses selected by the student (with parent(s), who will provide the counselor course information to include prefix, number, title, and CRNs for online or at a USF Campus course. For all students taking courses on their high school campus, no CRN is required.

EARLY ADMISSION

Early Admission is a form of dual enrollment whereby eligible high school students are admitted to USF as fulltime students for fall and spring semesters of their high school senior year.

During the early admission year, students take 12-15 credits each semester. The courses they take earn credit toward both a baccalaureate degree and completion of the high school diploma.

Early admission is open to students from any high school setting: public school districts, charter schools, private schools, or homeschools. Schools, School Districts, Homeschooled students interested in making early admissions can request an Early Admission Articulation Agreement with USF by submitting an **electronic request**. Use the hyperlink to submit a request.

Students must start the Early Admission Process as early as the summer before or the beggining of their Junior Year of High School.

Early Admissions (Full Time) Eligibility Requirements



- ✓ Rising 12th Grade Students Full Year Commitment
- ✓ Minimum 3.8 GPA as calculated by USF
- ✓ Minimum scores on one of the following tests:
 - SAT: 1300 with at least 580 in Reading
 - ACT: 29 composite with at least a 29 in English
- ✓ Degree-seeking Student Application
- ✓ Early Admissions Approval Forms
- ✓ May want to consider applying to Judy Genshaft Honors College
- ✓ Deadline = March 15th

- 9th-12th grade

Early Admissions

- Senior in High School only
- 12 to 15 credits
- SAT/ACT qualifying testing only
- Higher entrance GPA 3.8+
- Full time USF degree seeking student would not need to reapply to USF after High School graduation




Test Preparation is VITAL!


