

Benefits of Career Dual Enrollment

- All programs provide job-ready training. Most programs take approximately one year to complete and offer the opportunity for licensure or certification.
- Some programs and industry certifications allow the student to earn articulated college credit at State College of Florida (SCF) and other colleges. For more information see an MTC Counselor.
- Schooling is covered for Manatee County students who are part of the district. Student's tuition, lab fees, and some additional expenses are covered. Students however are responsible for some pre-admission costs and uniforms.



What is Advanced Placement (AP)?



Nationally standardized, college-level curriculum developed by College Board in over 30 subject areas.



Opportunity to earn credit for college by achieving a specific score on an AP exam at the end of the year.



Exams are scored on a scale of 1-5. Typically, a Level 3 or higher earns credit.



AP Classroom is a virtual tool that benefits students as they prepare for the AP exams.



Advanced Placement (AP) Quick Facts

Main Questions	Points to Consider
Where are courses offered?	On BRHS Campus.
What is the application process?	Include the course(s) on BRHS Course Request Form.
What are the requirements to enroll?	Recommended 3.00 GPA and Level 3 or higher on most recent FAST/EOC.
How is GPA calculated for high school?	GPA at BRHS is calculated on a 5.0 scale. * Colleges and Bright Futures program may only calculate GPA on 4.50 scale.
How is the college credit awarded?	AP Exam are scored on scale of 1 – 5. Most colleges award credit for a score of 3 or higher. * Students may use AP Credit Policy Search Tool to research specific institutions.
Is transportation provided?	Students may ride the bus to BRHS if within the school zone.
What is the cost?	AP course materials and exams are paid for by the School District.
What is the impact on college/university transcript?	No impact on post-secondary GPA. * Credit may appear on college transcript as CR (credit) or P (Pass) with number of credit hours.

Dispelling the Myth about AP Scores

College Board Research Findings - June 2021

→ Enrollment Records for 1.5 million students and a subsample of 410,000 students with college grades ←

Key Takeaway: AP students who earn a score of 1 or 2 or average a score of 1 or 2 across their AP Exams in high school, have **better college outcomes** than academically similar college students who did not take an AP course and exam.

Finding # 1: AP students are **more likely to enroll in a four-year college** in comparison to academically similar peers who did not take AP courses.

Finding # 2: Students who earn AP scores of 2 are **well prepared to succeed** in introductory college coursework.

Finding # 3: Many students who first score a 1 or 2 on an AP exam will **take more AP courses and score higher.**


AP Capstone Courses - Seminar & Research

What It Is

AP Capstone is not a course. It's a two-year program based on two AP courses—AP Seminar and AP Research. Other AP courses teach you, in depth, about a specific subject, like biology or U.S. history. AP Seminar and AP Research are different. They focus on helping you develop academic skills you can use in any discipline. These skills include:

✓ Critical thinking: View issues from multiple perspectives and create arguments based on evidence.	✓ Collaboration: Work alone, in a group, and with expert advisers to communicate your ideas.
✓ Conducting research: Explore various research methods and complete research projects on topics of your own choosing.	✓ Public speaking: Present and defend your work as a group and individually.

What is Dual Enrollment (College Credit)?

Dual Enrollment provides an opportunity for students to earn credit for courses that meet both high school graduation requirements and can be used towards a degree program at the collegiate level.

BRHS partners with two institutions to provide dual enrollment opportunities:

- University of South Florida
- State College of Florida

Students can enroll in part-time or full-time dual enrollment programs while in high school.

Dual Enrollment (DE) Quick Facts

Main Questions	Points to Consider
Where are courses offered?	On campus with USF and off campus at SCF or USF Campuses.
What is the application process?	Online application. *Depending on the program, student may also be required to submit proof of residency, immunization record, online orientation, and DE contract.
What are the requirements to enroll?	Both institutions require a specific cumulative GPA and minimum PERT, SAT, or ACT scores.
How is GPA calculated for high school?	GPA at BRHS is calculated on a 5.0 scale. * Colleges and Bright Futures program may only calculate GPA on 4.50 scale.
How is the college credit awarded?	Grade earned in the course is recorded on both high school transcript and college transcript.
Is transportation provided?	Students or families must provide own transportation to USF or SCF.
What is the cost?	Tuition and required textbooks are provided by the School District.
What is the impact on college/university transcript?	Course grades are calculated into post-secondary GPA. * Students must submit an official transcript from USF or SCF to any other college/university that he or she may attend in the future.



Dual Enrollment vs Early Admission

Dual Enrollment

- ▶ 8th - 12th grade
- ▶ 3-6 credits first semester
- ▶ Takes Up to 11 credits after 6 credits with C or better are completed
- ▶ Qualifying testing options (ie.) Accuplacer (CPT), PERT, SAT, ACT, PSAT, CLT.
- ▶ 3.5 + GPA
- ▶ Maintains 2.0 GPA in college courses
- ▶ Part time Non Degree seeking applicant (Non Degree Application)

Early Admissions

- ▶ Senior in High School only (applies while a Junior in High School by March 1st of their Junior year)
- ▶ Takes 12 to 15 credits
- ▶ SAT/ACT qualifying testing only
- ▶ 3.8 + GPA
- ▶ Maintains 2.0 GPA in college courses
- ▶ Full time USF Degree seeking applicant (Degree seeking application)
- ▶ Student would not need to reapply to USF after High School graduation

Step by Step Guide for Dual Enrollment



Step 1:

Student Applies to USF as a Non Degree seeking student from the Dual Enrollment Web Link

Step 2:

Student Sets up NET ID & USF email

Step 3:

Student Completes Immunization Documentation *on HS or USF campus

Step 4:

Student Fills out Dual Enrollment Form 1 (that's your info.)

Step 5:

Student works with counselor to select Courses (this info goes on Form 2)

Step 6:

Counselor submits Dual Enrollment FORM 2

Step 7:

Student Self Registers for Online or On USF Campus courses

Step 8:

Students get courtesy registered for on High School USF Dual Enrollment Courses

Step 9:

Student must attend first day of class to avoid **DROP**. Log onto online course or attend USF campus

From the Application Procedure Page Read All STEPS First THEN apply here:

12. **APPLY:** The application process is initiated by completing the online **USF “Non-Degree Seeking” Application**, as a High School Dual Enrollment student. (laptop/desktop)
13. **NET ID:** STUDENTS must **ACTIVATE their NetID (USF email) 3 DAYS AFTER APPLYING.** **Activation of Student NetID** is found here. Do this by using the same email used on the application or use a U Number - **DO NOT USE A PHONE;** only on laptop/desktop with google chrome. USF communications will only be sent to student's USF email account. **DO NOT WAIT FOR AN EMAIL FROM IT, it MAY NOT BE SENT TO YOU.** Having trouble?

Student Applies to USF as Degree Seeking Student from Early Admission Web Link while in Grade 11 by March 1st

Step 2:

Student Sets up NET ID & USF email

Step 3:

Student Completes Immunization Documentation

Step 4:

Student Fills out Early Admission Form 1(EA)

Step 5:

Student works with School Counselor and USF academic advisor to select courses.

Step 6:

High School Counselor submits Early Admission FORM 2 (EA)

Step 7:

A) Student must sign up for ORIENTATION session and can register and attend.
B) Student Self Registers for Online or On-Campus courses

Step 8:

Student must attend first week of class to avoid DROP

Step 9: Starts second year automatically. additional application is needed.

EARLY ADMISSION

Early Admission is a form of dual enrollment whereby eligible high school students are admitted to USF as fulltime students for fall and spring semesters of their high school senior year.

During the early admission year, students take 12-15 credits each semester. The courses they take earn credit toward both a baccalaureate degree and completion of the high school diploma.

Early admission is open to students from any high school setting: public school districts, charter schools, private schools, or homeschooled students interested in making early admissions can request an Early Admission Articulation Agreement with USF by submitting an **electronic request**. Use the hyperlink to submit a request.

Students must start the Early Admission Process as early as the summer before or the beginning of their Junior Year of High School.

From the Application Procedure Page Read All but apply here:

Early Admissions online applications must be completed by **March 1st**

2. Students initiate the application process by completing the online **USF "Degree Seeking" Application**. When completing this application they will select the Fall Semester of their high school senior year. **When it asks, "Will you have graduated from high school prior to enrolling at USF?" say YES. DO NOT PAY** the application fee and tuition/admissions deposit. Both will be waived.

Look for the Personal Information tab** **6. open that tab** **7. click on View Immunization Record**. Find meningitis vaccine, and click **decline meningitis immunization** **8. click submit**.
- This will clear the Student Health Services Hold on your account. Within 30 minutes the hold will be removed.

Early College Programs

- **Dual Enrollment (up to 11 credit hours)** allows for qualified students to enroll in approved college coursework that will satisfy both high school and college requirements. *Students may qualify as early as 6th grade. Most students begin dual enrollment in their junior year of high school.*
- **Early Admissions (12-15 credit hours)** allows qualified seniors to enroll in approved college coursework full-time during semester 1 and/or semester 2 in high school. *Students **must** register for a minimum of 12 credit hours.*
- **Accelerated Dual Enrollment (12-15 credit hours)** allows qualified rising juniors to potentially earn the AA degree *(For Manatee & Sarasota county public school students and Lemon Bay High School & Charlotte Virtual in Charlotte County).* *Students **must** register for a minimum of 12 credit hours. Fall start only.*

- Academically ready for 11th grade. English I & II completed; completed Algebra I and passed EOC, completed Geometry, and passed Grade 10 English Language Assessment.



Enrollment Process

- Visit scf.edu/earlycollege and follow the step-by-step instructions to complete the enrollment process (this process takes several weeks to complete).
- **Step 1-Early College Application**
 - Complete the Early College Application (link on webpage).
 - Upon acceptance, SCF will send a series of Welcome Emails that include student credentials (G00#, username, password) and a link to the online orientation.
 - Students are required to send all communications through their SCF student email.
 - If the student is continuing dual enrollment courses, a new application is not required. A new application is required to return to the Early College programs after participating in our college enrichment/non-degree program.

STEP 3: Click on the *Email* link to access your SCF student email.





Enrollment Process

•Step 2 - Official Test Scores

- Must be sent to the Office of the Registrar (registrar@scf.edu) directly by the student through College Board, ACT, or Cambridge.
- Super scoring is available with SAT/ACT/PERT.
- Students may take the PERT for free with SCF. PERT is by appointment only.
- PERT group testing will be available on the Bradenton campus in March. Counselors will be notified once days and times have been selected.
- Students may test once per semester and no more than twice per calendar year.

Enrollment Process

- **Step 3-Early College Contract** is submitted as part of the admission process. This digital contract includes the type of enrollment (DE, EA, ADE) and area of interest (pathway). *This form requires student, parent, and counselor approval and is student initiated.*
- **Step 4-Online Orientation** is required prior to registration for new SCF students. Link to complete orientation is included in the Welcome Email.
- **Step 5-SCF Registration** must be secured prior to the DE deadline. Students should connect with their SCF Success Coach for assistance with registration. Students must submit a detailed schedule to their high school counselor after completing registration.
- **Step 6-Get Instructional Materials**
